Using our website has become easier

Now that the Village website has become fully functional, thanks to Professor Diana Schwerha and her students, you will find it easier to use and very helpful. Try it. You'll like it.

When you go to the Internet connection on your computer, go to the http line at the top. You will find this much faster and more direct than using Google or whatever other search engine comes up lower on the screen.

Use your Member Handbook that was handed out at the first anniversary party. (If you did not get a handbook then, contact Patty Mercer — see masthead — about how to get yours.) The final page of the handbook is entirely devoted to the website, so use it for a guide.

Basically, your search line should look like this:

The website will lead you to such headings as "What Is The Athens Village?, What Is Happening?, What Do We Provide?, Want To Help?, Future Plans, and Accessibility."

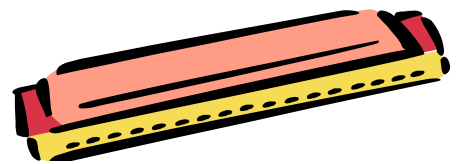

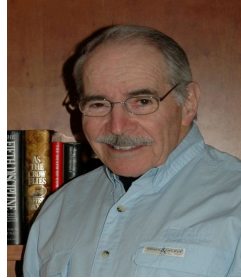
Attendees will also discuss a friendly screening program for volunteers and address any hesitancy members have about allowing a stranger into their homes.

Lane's Corner: A monthly list of handy tips

The recent tornado/straight-line wind in this area made all of us aware that we should be prepared for emergency. Your family should have an escape plan and an emergency kit.



A handy thing in which to keep an emergency kit is a good-sized cooler, one large enough to keep some frozen food in case of a power outage. In your emergency kit you should have a good flashlight and extra batteries to fit it. I recommend against candles because of danger in case of a gas leak and other factors (such as tipping over or igniting flammable things that are too close). You should also have a battery-powered radio (again, with extra batteries that fit). Or you could have one of those wind-up radios.

Some of you have generators to use in case of a power outage. Always keep your generator full of gas, and have an extra can of gas on hand. (If the power is out, filling-station pumps are out, too.) Start your generator about once a month and let it run for 5 minutes or so. Use only fresh gas in your generator. You can tell when stored gas has gone bad because it will have a pungent odor, not the fresh-gas odor you smell around cars and filling stations.
